WJCS Annual Gala raises record \$800,000; Honors Scarsdale's Barry Kaplan, Nina Ross

The WJCS 2016 Gala, which honored Board President Barry Kaplan and Board Member Nina Ross last night at the Willow Ridge Country Club, was the most successful gala in the agency's history, raising \$800,000.

The honorees were lauded for their countless efforts to ensure that the agency continues to provide leading-edge programs and services. Barry Kaplan, who has served as president for the past three years and a member for 10, was recognized for his hands-on involvement and leadership marked by respect, humility and keen intelligence during very difficult financial times. He is president and founder of Maple Tree Capital Management, LLC, a private investment firm and a former partner and managing director of Goldman, Sachs & Company.

Nina Ross, a board member for six years and a prolific volunteer, has served the agency in several capacities, rolling up her sleeves to write and win grants, created significant volunteer programs to enrich the lives of students attending after-school programs in Mt. Vernon, and most recently founded an art exploration program.

In thanking the attendees for their commitment, Robert Stavis, managing director of Bessemer Ventures Partners, WJCS past president and current board member emphasized, "Support from the community for the work of WJCS is essential now more than ever. The 300 guests in attendance heard compelling stories from clients who have benefitted from the agency's array of mental health, trauma, disability, youth, home care and geriatric services.
