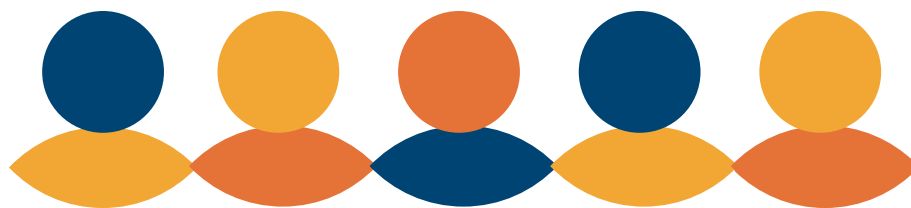

Because of you...WJCS' Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics Offer Life-Saving Support to Individuals in Need

With support and recognition from the Federal Government through SAMHSA grants, WJCS' community behavioral health clinics in Yonkers, Mt. Vernon, Hartsdale and Peekskill have transitioned to *Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics (CCBHC)*

Through this model our clinics have expanded to include substance use disorder treatment, peer support services, employment assistance, and care management – recognizing that comprehensive guidance and support is needed to navigate life's challenges.

Because of you...WJCS Has a Variety of Programs and Services that Offer Meaningful Connection and Hands-on Assistance During Home and Mental Health Service Visits

Often this extra layer of support makes all the difference to individuals struggling with not only their mental health, but also feelings of isolation and other life challenges that are roadblocks to their recovery.

M. is a client who was at risk of losing her housing while experiencing a complicated and life-threatening medical issue. The WJCS team helped M and her family accept support and were there for her every step of the way...from her time in the hospital to a medical rehabilitation facility and then into an assisted living facility...advocating for services and care. M. is now able to successfully walk with a rolling walker, knows her medication routine, and her long list of medical concerns are now stable. She is working on creating goals and achieving them so that she can live on her own again. While M. still struggles with her mental health, she has more days of positive thoughts than negative. She is safe, healthy, and smiling for the first time in many months.



Last winter, T. became very upset and tearful in the parking lot after a therapy session because he hadn't had heat in his house for a few weeks. Franny, a WJCS Peer Specialist, sat with T. for about three hours until he felt better and safe to go home. Franny made plans with T. to visit the Department of Social Services the next day to help get him emergency assistance with HEAP. In those hours of speaking, Franny was able to help T. turn what was a very hopeless situation, into something that T. could overcome.

L. received employment support from our WJCS specialist but after some time determined that her job was not a good environment for her and struggled with what to do about it. They worked through a stressful process of deciding to leave and finding new employment. The specialist also worked with L. on developing additional job skills, including how to deal with difficult situations at work. L. received three job offers, and with the specialist's support, was able to choose the job that felt like the best fit. L. has grown professionally, and, as a result, experienced positive impacts on her life.

81,082 mental health and wraparound services provided.



Because of you...The Trager Lemp Center for Trauma & Resilience Promotes Healing and Provides Education Throughout Westchester County.

Psychological trauma is caused by difficult life experiences like physical abuse, sexual abuse, and community violence. Our trauma clinicians help break the intergenerational cycle of abuse through sensitive evidence-based treatment. Thanks to compassionate people like you, our trauma clinicians help trauma survivors overcome obstacles, heal, and live a more full life.

This support plays a vital role in helping employees overcome challenging hurdles and retain their jobs.

Because of you... A Family has a Home

Affordable housing and basic needs continue to be challenging for many of the people we support.

One baker, a single mother to a seventeen-year-old daughter and two-year-old son, had been sleeping on couches in a family member's basement, trying to save enough money for rent. Not knowing what to do, she reached out to Hilary, the WJCS case manager. Hilary helped her gather all the required paperwork, filled out the application for Section 8 housing, and assisted her in overcoming a big hurdle, proving she was not receiving any child support. After a long waiting period, the family was granted a reduced rental rate that she can afford as well as SNAP benefits to supplement her monthly grocery expenses. Life is still challenging but, thanks to your generosity, they are hopeful this is a new beginning and steps to a better future.



Because of you...Youth Find Safety and Support

For many youth living in under-resourced families and communities, life can be complex. WJCS provides many programs that help youth connect, engage with caring and trained staff to address their challenges, and provide them with opportunities that inspire dreams and visions for thriving in life.

One day a 7th grade female student came to WJCS's Margaret's Place (MP) school-based room upset and crying. We learned that she had a history of fighting with other students in the last year and arguing with school staff. During the first session with the MP counselor, the student disclosed she was sexually molested as an eleven-years-old while on a vacation in another country. She also told the counselor that her family is aware of the event and that her father blamed her for what happened. The MP counselor helped her understand it was not her fault and that engaging in therapy could help her gain the coping skills she needed to stop being angry all the time and she bravely took that important first step and agreed. While she has a long road to heal, your support ensures she has a safe and supportive place to go.

Pathways To Care for Individuals and Families Experiencing Chronic Illness

S. was 79, enjoying retirement with his wife, and living an active lifestyle when he was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer. Those two words turned their lives upside down and caused so much fear, anxiety, depression, and just a loss of self. They were worried about how they would manage when he came home after surgery and through treatment. WJCS helped S and his wife with individual and couples counseling and connected them to the community resources they needed. "We are so grateful for WJCS's support during this stressful and scary time."

E. and her family were devastated when E. was diagnosed at 50 years old with ALS. WJCS wrapped their arms around them to provide social work, family counseling, and other resources throughout the trajectory of her illness. Sadly, this included end-of-life support and bereavement for loved ones.

The levels of stress, anxiety, and depression coming out of COVID continued to play a significant role during the fiscal year and we experienced an increase in requests for bereavement support, socialization for isolated seniors, and caregiving and parenting support.

Your profound generosity and caring also meant that we were able to continue and enhance support for our youth who struggle with dysregulation, anxiety, and depression as well as their parents, teachers, and clergy.

Holocaust Survivors and Second Generation

Thanks to funding from the Claims Conference and your generous donations, we support 85 Holocaust Survivors. One group survived as youth experiencing the ghetto, the concentration camps, or hiding in the forests. The other survivors were babies or very young children who were hidden with gentile families. We also provide support to 60 Second Generation family members struggling from a lifetime of parental-child dynamics and challenges complicated by deep guilt.

Ida is one of our beloved Holocaust Survivors and is the most resilient person we know. She was born in 1923 in Poland and upon the Nazi occupation was sent from ghetto to ghetto. She worked in numerous labor camps: in forests, roadways, and an ammunition factory in Germany. She was eventually sent to Bergen-Belsen concentration camp, and was liberated from there at the end of the war. When liberated, she chose to reclaim two of the four years of her life that the Nazis stole from her by changing her date of birth, and has since stated she was born in 1925 not 1923, but she did in fact turn 100 years old last summer. She comes to every Holocaust Survivor Program we offer, and we provide transportation for her to share in these events. She has a homecare aid that comes to her home daily. We provide her with weekly home-delivered kosher meals, as well as holiday food. Volunteers visit Ida regularly to help her not feel so isolated.

“My 16-year-old son, his friend, and I sat with our new friend for almost two hours. She told us about the horrors she endured in the concentration camps and the death march, and how she survived because of the kindness of strangers. She told the teenagers to be accepting of all people, and hate no one- that nothing good comes from hate. She shared with us family stories, memories of arriving in America, and photos of her family. We shared challah, rugalach, and lit the candles to bring in Shabbat together. We can’t wait to return next month with photos of our family to share with her. Thanks to the generosity of the Leffell Foundation we were able to provide a safety net to 23 under-resourced Jewish women struggling to meet basic needs for themselves and their families and often on the edge of losing their housing.



Because of you...Seniors Get the Support They Need to Remain Safely in Their Homes and the Communities They Love for as Long As Possible. Their Families Get Peace of Mind

Westchester County has more seniors than many places in the country. A lot of our seniors are struggling economically, working longer to compensate, or facing medical crisis that erode savings. Seniors on fixed incomes can't cover rising rent and housing costs in the county, let alone medication and food.

B. is 92 years old and grieving the loss of her 97-year-old husband, a decorated World War II veteran. After losing her husband, B. wanted to remain living in their home but worried how to do so safely on her own. B. met with a WJCS case manager who helped coordinate a variety of services to help B. process the loss of her husband, address her neglected medical issues during her husband's illness, and deal with financial management issues, including support for food, housekeeping, help with her impaired mobility, transportation to medical appointments, and medication reminders. We continue to check in on B. and she is managing safely in her home.

J. is in her late 60's and thought she was in an impossible situation. She was working full time when her husband fell ill and now needed home care. Financially, she couldn't stop working and they couldn't afford private help. WJCS helped direct her to apply for Medicaid for her husband so she could get home care covered. Once in place, J. was able to return to work knowing that her husband was well cared for until she returned home.

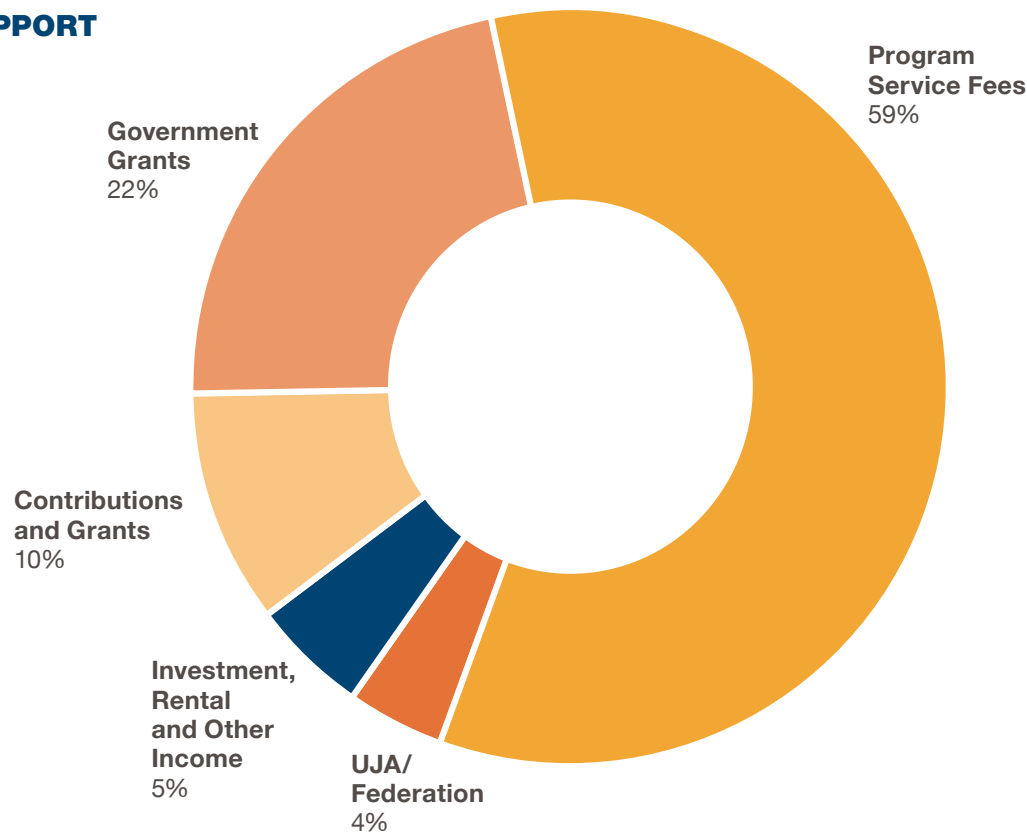

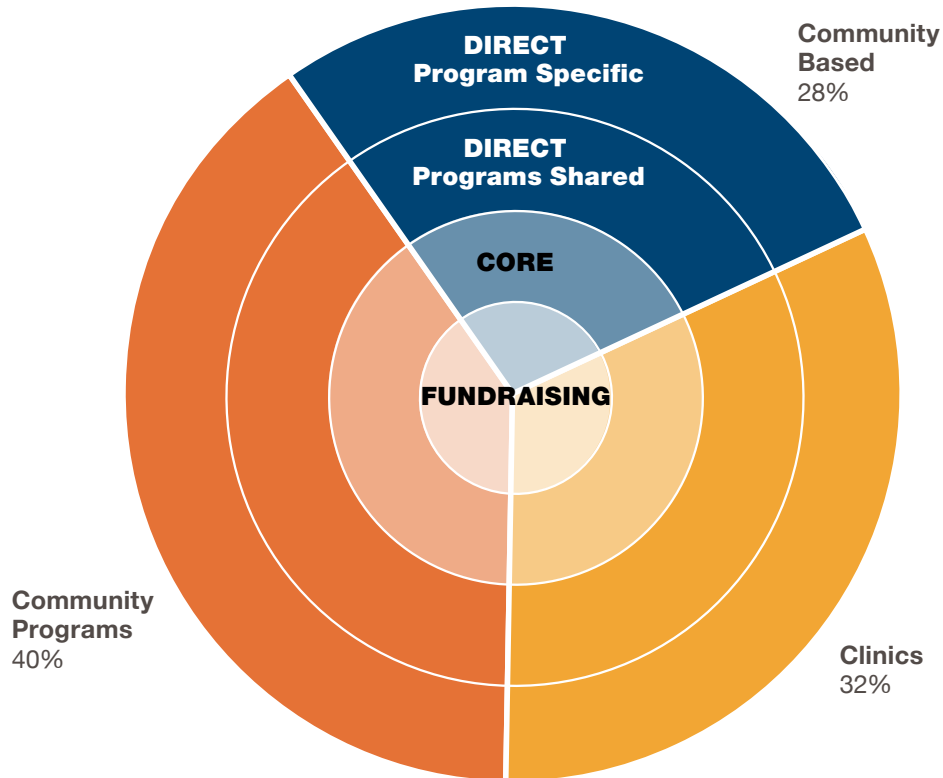
